A MESSAGE FROM FR. BARRETT

The Lord be with you!

I don't know about you, but I am glad that Christmas Eve and Christmas Day don't fall on Sunday and Monday every year. The altar guild was confused. The choir was confused. Some days I was confused! Now the calendar has another unusual convergence of dates in 2024. Feb. 14th is both Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday! That's right the romantic day for lovers and the beginning of Lent fall on the same day! Even worse, Valentine's Day originates with a pagan holiday! This is a strange convergence indeed!

I am sure you all know about Lent, but maybe not so much about Valentine's Day or its namesake, St. Valentinus. The Roman Catholic Church attributes this saint to at least three traditions. One is that Valentinus was a priest in Rome. The Emperor Claudius, believing that single men made better soldiers, outlawed marriages of military age men. Valentinus defied him and continued to marry young lovers in secret. For this crime he was beheaded. Another tradition is that the same man befriended Christian prisoners and tried to ease their suffering. While ministering to them, he fell in love with the jailer's daughter and wrote a note "from your Valentine." This is still a traditional greeting on Valentine's Day.

Anyway, once again his penalty was death. The third tradition is that Valentine, Bishop of Terni, also executed by Claudius, is being honored. The saint's death is placed at around 270 AD.

Like Christmas, the Church borrowed a pagan holiday and made it a Christian festival on the calendar. Romans celebrated Lupercalia on the ides of Feb. (2/15). This was a festival honoring both Faunus, the god of agriculture, and Romulus, the legendary founder of Rome. The two holidays existed side by side until the end of the fifth century when the Church banned the celebration of Lupercalia.

Valentine's Day was very popular in the middle Ages, especially in England and France. Feb. 15 was considered the beginning of the birds' mating season. So it was associated with romance and love. Written greetings became popular after 1400, colonists carried the tradition to North America. In the 1840s Esther Howland, known as "Mother Valentine," began mass producing valentine cards. Today the exchange of cards numbers over 145 million and is second only to Christmas cards.

The Bible has been described as "love letters from God." The most powerful Valentine in history came from God in the Passion of our Lord and Savior. God said "I love you" to humanity in the most explicit statement of sacrificial love ever known. So in a few weeks we turn to the season of Lent and contemplate Jesus' walk to the cross. Please be with us for the whole season and our worship.

My guess is that we will be making delivery on or about (Wednesday) March 20^{th.}


Whatever you can do to support this ministry will be greatly appreciated.



ITINERARY

May 6 - Seattle, Washington, USA 4:00 PM Departure

If you arrive in Seattle early enough in the day, try to visit the Space Needle. Built for the 1962 World's Fair, it offers a breathtaking 360-degree view of Seattle, Elliot Bay and the Olympic and Cascade mountain ranges, including Mt. Rainier.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: YOU MUST BOARD THE SHIP AT LEAST 2 - 3 HOURS BEFORE DEPARTURE.

May 7 - At Sea

May 8 - Icy Strait Point

11:59 AM Arrival /9:00 PM Departure

Icy Strait Point is one tiny port that's big on the Alaskan wilderness and Native culture. Opened a decade ago by the Huna Tlingit Native Alaskans, it's easily one of the best spots in the region for fishing and whale watching. Dive into Native Alaska culture at a tribal dance show or pay a visit to Hoonah, Alaska's largest Tlingit village. If you want to venture over to the wild side, go on a guided nature hike through nearby rainforests or hop into an ATV and explore the backroads of Chichagof Island. At the end of the day, you can take in forest views while soaring high above the trees on the longest zip line in the world. No matter what kind of Alaska adventure you're craving, you'll find it in Icy Strait Point.

May 9 - Skagway, Alaska

7:00 AM Arrival / 5:00 PM Departure

The tiny town of Skagway still looks like it did during the Klondike Gold Rush over 100 years ago. Today, it remains an outpost for a thrilling Alaskan adventure. An old-time streetcar ride along bustling Broadway Street reveals well-preserved buildings, including the state's oldest hotel. You can see engraved walrus tusks at the Corrington Museum or get lost in riveting historical reenactments around town. If outdoor adventure is more your thing, there are plenty of ways to amp up the adrenaline, from sledding with Alaskan Huskies on Laughton Glacier to rafting Lynn Canal, the longest fjord in North America.

May 10 - Endicott Arm & Dawes Glacier & Juneau

5:00 AM Arrival /10:00 AM Departure - Endicott Arms & Dawes Glacier 1:00 PM Arrival /7:00 PM Departure - Juneau

One of Alaska's lesser-known gems, Endicott Arm Fjord, marks the southern edge of Fords Terror Wilderness area. As you drift through its 30-mile-long stretch, you cannot help but be awed by the surrounding granite cliffs, mountain valleys and dozens of gushing waterfalls. Drifting icebergs, deep blue waters and a spectacular tidewater glacier only add to this natural spectacle's appeal. You cannot get to Juneau easily without a sprint by air or by sea. But once you arrive, you will find majestic views and rich culture in every corner. With its snowcapped mountains, misty rainforests, massive glaciers and bounty of wildlife, Alaska's remote state capital is the perfect place to dive into nature. Framed by Mount Juneau and Mount Roberts, the city's picturesque downtown area offers historical bars, boutique shops and significant landmarks. For a taste of the local culture, visit the historic district and the Alaska State Museum. And for outdoor thrills, you can take your pick of activities ranging from whale watching in Auke Bay Harbor to tundra trekking over Mendenhall Glacier. You can even try your hand at gold panning in Last Chance Basin.
